Sewing Kit Project 2021 DAISY BATMAN - QUILT MINISTRY

Needle and thread - who would have thought that such small and simple items would bring together so many people to fulfill a request so quickly. The DUMC Quilt Ministry did just that.

One of our members Ann Cripps is a Red Cross Volunteer. Due to the recent arrival of Afghanistan refugees she was deployed to Fort McCoy in Wisconsin. Ann is assisting over 8,800 Afghans upon their arrival in the United States. Working with the refugee women, she determined there was a need for needles and thread. Ann requested the help of our DUMC Quilt Ministry for mini sewing kits with a needle and a spool of any thread. The Quilt Ministry went above and beyond by soliciting and receiving a large thread donation from YLI Thread Corporation in Rock Hill, SC. The members donated thread, scissors, thimbles, straight pins, safety pins, rulers, buttons, and lots of needles. In a matter of four days from the date the request was made, it took only two hours of fun and fellowship to make 160 mini sewing kits with more than just a needle and thread.





Many thanks to the volunteers who were available to make kits, and to all our members, past and present, who for 25 years have served our local communities and beyond.

DUMC Quilt Ministry makes and delivers quilted comfort to seriously ill infants, children, and senior adults as a reminder of God's love. Extravagant Generosity

Bishop Robert Schnase defines extravagant generosity as an "...un-selfish willingness to share and give from all of our resources in a way that exceeds all expectations. It describes lavish sharing, sacrifice, and giving in service to God and neighbor."

Extravagant generosity requires the reordering of our priorities, of living as if Christ really is Lord of our lives, including our time, our service, and our money. Churches and individuals who practice extravagant generosity know that we have a deepseated need to be generous, because God has made us in God's image, and God is generous. We practice being generous not because we think we can buy God's favor or repay God for all that God has done, or because we feel guilty or coerced, or because the Church needs money. Rather, we give generously as a way of expressing our love and gratitude to God. When we place our offering in the offering cabinets or make an online contribution we are essentially saying, "God, this is one of the ways this week that I want to say thank you and I love you."



When we practice generosity at least two things happen. First, we grow closer to God. Through being generous we learn that the real source of our life is not found in our bank account. We learn to trust God in new ways. Second, through generosity we participate in God's mission of rescuing the world. So, when we give to God through the mission of DUMC:

- Children and youth build relationships and experience a deeper connection with God
- · Sacred music is played and sung, and we are drawn into the beauty of God's presence in worship
- Food and shelter are provided for our vulnerable neighbors
- You can read your worship bulletin or participate in online worship because the lights are on, and our technology is up and running
- Individuals deepen their faith through ministries of retreat, prayer, and contemplation
- Loved ones receive pastoral care and support during illness
- Our facilities are warm, or cool, and clean
- The gospel is proclaimed and lived on college campuses
- · Students answer a call to ordained ministry
- Missional impact is made through ministries like Ada Jenkins, Habitat for Humanity, Bags of Hope, Bridges, mission trips, and much, much more
- Care teams provide support and encouragement for those in crisis
- Small groups meet for prayer, learning, fellowship, and accountable discipleship
- Older adults share lunch and fellowship and life together
- People travel to Guatemala to serve God's children
- And so much more

So, hopefully a picture is emerging. It's not just a check; it's not just a little money. Your generosity is an investment in God's Kingdom. Your giving matters to you, to people you might never meet, and to God.

Thank you, Davidson UMC for being generous. Thank you for loving Christ and giving to God. Thank you for sharing in God's mission of rescuing the world.

Equipped for the Task

One of the aspects of ministry at DUMC that has been the most fun for me has been training our small group leaders. If you haven't led a small group at DUMC, you may not be aware of the training process for group leaders. Prior to each of our Church-Wide Studies, we recruit and train new group leaders. We also open this training up to any existing group leader who would like to take part. To date, we've had 25 individuals go through this training. We've had Sunday School teachers, staff, and youth group leaders join in the fun!



In our training we gather for four 90-minute sessions, where we utilize a video-based resource called "Leading Life Changing Small Groups" by Bill Donahue. This training focuses on helping us to understand the power that small groups have to change lives and shape communities. The training includes teaching around the many practical skills necessary to facilitate groups. Our time together provides the space for us to discuss this video-teaching in a way that is engaging, interactive, and fun! The training covers the many important components of healthy group leadership: clarifying purpose, determining mission, vision, and values, caring for members, sharing leadership, measuring group progress, and impacting your world.

My favorite part of this experience is that it gives all of our leaders a chance to understand the kind of group experiences that we want to create, as we seek to help people connect deeply with God and with one another. We want to create small groups that help people grow, take responsibility for their faith, and become stronger disciples of Jesus Christ. Our training gives leaders a chance to catch that vision for group life! It helps them to understand the important part that each one of them plays in the overall ministry.

Another highlight for me is that this experience gives our team of coaches a chance to get to know our leaders. We have the opportunity to hear insights, questions, and take-aways from the teaching. We have the chance to hear what drew them to say "yes" to this ministry and how they think small groups can help us live out our mission. We get to hear what values they think are most important to emphasize in their groups and what needs they have for prayer, as they step into a new season of leadership. This sharing helps us give our leaders the support they need to carry out their leadership task. It helps us to learn how to pray for them and how to resource them. It helps us to know that we've not only recruited and trained them, but we are truly equipping them for the task to which God has called them! This is good work!


The DUMC Library Has a Great Collection of Bibles for Children

DUMC member Cheryl Greenwood reviewed the NIRV (New International Reader's Version) Adventure Bible for Early Readers. The DUMC Library has a copy of this Bible and many more available for check-out. Here's an abridged version of Cheryl's review; the full review is on the library's Facebook page.

"The Children's Adventure Bible is currently the best-selling children's Bible in English. Inside are packed all kinds of eye-catching and helpful features: Intros to Bible Books, Life in Bible Times, People in Bible Times, applications to life, words or concepts defined or explored, illustrations on almost every page, a concordance, and maps.

This New International Reader's Version is written on a third grade reading level, generally appropriate for ages 3-10. It has shorter sentences, simpler words, and more sections with titles than the NIV."

Youth Serve: Operation Sandwich

Service is a foundational part of the Christian walk. In response to the love we have received from Jesus as seen on the cross, we look for ways to share that same love with others. This extension of love can be as thorough as building a well for an African village or as simple as making a sandwich for someone. In September, DUMC Youth had this very opportunity to be the hands and feet of Jesus for the Urban Ministry Center of Charlotte. The center exists with the goal of supporting vulnerable homelessness populations and helping them overcome their circumstances. This mission is not accomplished alone though as they rely on the support of sponsors and churches.

In response to this need, the youth came together to make 450 sandwiches for the center which serves meals 365 days a year. By the time we finished, the students made 489 ham, turkey, chicken, and cheese sandwiches to fill the bellies of those struggling. Not only were they fed, the homeless experienced 489 mini-gospel messages of love. That's our hope with DUMC Youth. We want Jesus to shine through everything we do, whether it's speaking the gospel, painting homes, or making sandwiches.
